

The Pastor's Corner

Did you know that there are approximately 2.2 billion Christians in the world today? Professor Leonard Sweet, Professor of Evangelism at Drew Theological School has written that the new geographic center of worldwide Christianity has shifted slightly in recent years. The new global center-point for Christianity is not the Vatican, or the former Compaq Center in Houston, Texas, or even South Korea. It is Timbuktu.

Do you know where Timbuktu is? It is a small city in Mali, a country in West Africa. It is the ultimate definition of "the middle of nowhere." In 1986, I flew over Timbuktu on a trip from Accra, Ghana to Dakar, Senegal. At night one could barely see the lights from the city. And yet, if we think about it, what better place is there for the center of Christianity? Where is the hope and love of Jesus Christ needed more that in a place that is both symbolically and literally in the middle of nowhere.

Another place that is in need of the hope and love of Jesus Christ right now is the tiny country of Nepal. On April 25th Nepal experienced an enormous earthquake which devastated much of the country. There are now over 7,000 people who are among the dead. Much needed relief supplies are making their way to this mountainous part of the world and to the capital, Kathmandu. UMCOR is there providing help and hope in a time of great need.

Another place where Jesus is calling us to offer help and hope is in Atlantic City. Our Cape Atlantic District has formed an Atlantic City Economic Recovery Team, which is working together to provide crisis counseling and life coaching skills to those who are part of the economic tsunami that has hit Atlantic City. The District has received a \$10,000 grant from the General Board of Church and Society to begin the hard work of restoring hope to those who are still facing job losses and layoffs.

Long ago the profit Isaiah wrote: "Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken... says the Lord." As disciples of Jesus Christ let us continue to pray for the transformation of our world and have compassion for all those in need – wherever they live.

God loves you and I'll see you in Church.

BEING REMARKABLE

Have you ever been to a wonderful restaurant or experienced an event that caused you to say, "That was remarkable! Webster's defines remarkable as "notably or conspicuously unusual; extraordinary or striking."

For those of us who live here on the Seven Mile Island, it is a remarkable place. For those who come to visit from throughout the United States, the experience is even more extraordinary.

That is why we need to think about how to become a remarkable congregation. In many ways, we are already a remarkable church. But being even more remarkable is the add-on, the special sauce, and the thing that will help our church grow. Being remarkable means that others are talking about our church in a positive way.

Here are a few ways that as a church we can become more remarkable:

- 1. Set a high standard of excellence in all that we do in church.
- 2. Serve the community- without being asked. Find a need and fill it.
- 3. Reach out to an organization that has been critical or passive about our church and invite them to lunch.
- Identify five key things in our church that need to be improved. It could be the sound system, the seating, the preaching, or the website – the list goes on. Then, improve them.
- 5. Open ourselves up for constructive feedback. Ask for input, invite in other leaders and experts. Give them permission to tell us what we need to hear, but may not want to hear.

Becoming more remarkable may require more effort but it's worth it.

Measuring Progress as a Vital Congregation

Each of us knows that it takes a skilled nurse to take our blood pressure, or a doctor to monitor our heart rate, in order to determine the quality of our overall health. Healthy Church often act in the same way. Our volunteers keep track of a number of important statistics which help our leadership determine the health of our congregation on an annual basis.

By keeping track of our average attendance in worship or the number of small groups that are active in the life of our congregation, we hope to accurately measure our progress in becoming a more vital and effective congregation.

Since 2011, when the Vital Congregation program began here, our Church has increased its vitality in many ways. Our average attendance in worship has moved from 79 people in 2011 to 82 people in 2014. We have advanced from having 6 small groups to having 16 small groups. Since 2011, we have received 4 new members by profession of faith and have added 3 new members by profession of faith in 2014 for a total of at least 7 new members by profession of faith since 2011. The number of people who are serving others in mission has exploded from 21 in 2011 to 80 in 2014. This means that more than half our members and friends are active in hands-on projects like Family Promise, Vacation Bible School, or supporting Caring for Kids. And finally, our mission funds came from a grant which we received from the Greater New Jersey Conference Board of Church and Society in 2014. This is all good news and represents a vitality that is inspiring.

Our goals for 2015 are:

1.	Average Attendance at Worship:	85 people
2.	Number of Small Groups	17 small groups
3.	New Members by Profession of Faith	3 people
4.	Number of People Involved in Mission	85 people
5.	Funds given for Mission	\$32,500

We have added to our list of goals 3 additional goals that are designed to increase our effectiveness as a Church in improving communication both internally, and externally, empowering laity to be better servant-leaders with improved training, and continuing to build the capacity of our 50-year building to meet the ministry challenges of the 21st century and to pass on our love for this Church to future generations who worship here. The creation of the Bell Choir and a new nursery / young children's room are a way to address the changing nature of our congregation.

The New Avalon Assembly A Chantanqua-like Experience at the Shore

The New Avalon Assembly returns for its 3rd year!

This summer, the New Avalon Assembly will be returning to our Church. The New Avalon Assembly is based on the Chautauqua experience of the late 1800's and early 1900's, which provided lectures, concerts, religious speakers, and the opportunity to "recreate one's oneself" in beautiful natural surroundings.

The New Avalon Assembly was formed in 2013, and has been designed to renew this unique forum for personal growth and enrichment. Program offerings have been developed around the four original pillars of the Chautauqua experience: arts, education, spiritual growth, and entertainment. This year's programs will be based on a common theme: **Origins and Destinations.**

Support for these events will be provided through a partnership with the Avalon Public Library and the Avalon History Center, and by contributions from the Southern New Jersey Health Council and generous individuals. The New Avalon Assembly is now a member of the Chautauqua Association, which seeks to bring together the organizations that were part of the original Chautauqua Circuit that flourished in the early 1900's and the new Chautauqua-like organizations that are being revived in resort communities throughout the United States and Canada.
